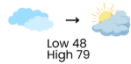

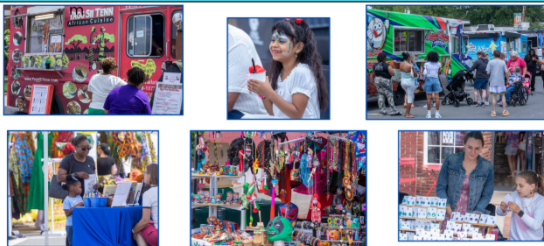

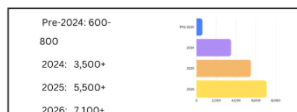

CULTUREFEST CONTINUES TO DEMONSTRATE ITS VALUE AS ONE OF GRANVILLE COUNTY'S MOST EFFECTIVE TOURISM AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES.

1. Based on attendance of approximately 7,100 visitors, conservative visitor spending estimates, and a local-first procurement strategy, the festival is generated between \$463,680 and \$670,432 in total economic activity.
2. With an operational budget of approximately \$33,000 and more than 80% of expenditures remaining within Granville County, CultureFest delivers a significant return on investment while supporting local businesses, increasing visitor traffic, and strengthening Oxford's position as a regional destination.
3. The festival has experienced substantial growth, increasing from approximately 600 attendees in its early years to more than 7,100 attendees in this year, with continued expansion anticipated through enhanced tourism marketing and programming investments.

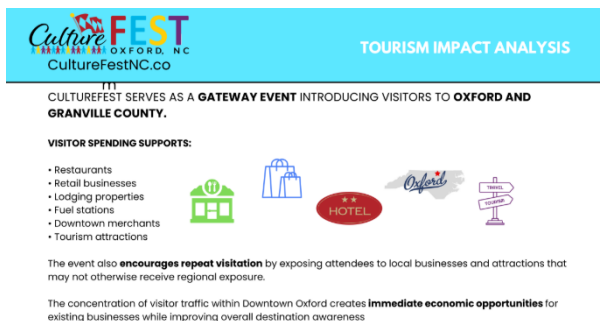
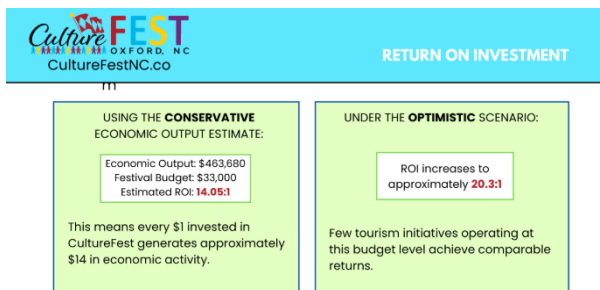

RESOLUTION

ADOPTING TAR RIVER REGIONAL

HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN

WHEREAS, the citizens and property within the City of Oxford are subject to the effects of natural hazards that pose threats to lives and cause damage to property, and with the knowledge and experience that certain areas of the county are particularly vulnerable to drought, extreme heat, hailstorm, hurricane and tropical storm, lightning, thunderstorm wind/high wind, tornado, winter storm and freeze, flood, hazardous material incident, and wildfire; and

WHEREAS, the City of Oxford desires to seek ways to mitigate the impact of identified hazard risks; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of North Carolina has in Article 5, Section 160D-501 of Chapter 160D of the North Carolina General Statutes, delegated to local governmental units the responsibility to adopt regulations designed to promote the public health, safety, and general welfare of its citizenry; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of North Carolina has enacted General Statute Section 166A-19.41 (*State emergency assistance funds*), which provides that for a state of emergency declared pursuant to G.S. 166A-19.20(a) after the deadline established by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the eligible entity shall have a hazard mitigation plan approved pursuant to the Stafford Act; and

WHEREAS, Section 322 of the Federal Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000, as amended, states that local governments must develop an All-Hazards Mitigation Plan in order to be eligible to receive future Hazard Mitigation Grant Program Funds and other disaster-related assistance funding, and that said Plan must be updated and adopted within a five-year cycle; and

WHEREAS, the (local government) has performed a comprehensive review and evaluation of each section of the previously approved Hazard Mitigation Plan and has updated the said plan as required under regulations and at 44 CFR Part 201 and according to guidance issued by the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the North Carolina Division of Emergency Management, and that the plans have been updated in accordance with federal laws including the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, as amended; the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968, as amended; the National Dam Safety Program Act, as amended; as required under regulations at 44 CFR Part 201, and according to guidance issued by the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the North Carolina Division of Emergency Management; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the Board of Commissioners of the City of Oxford to fulfill this obligation in order that the County will be eligible for federal and state assistance in the event that a state of disaster is declared for a hazard event affecting the County;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Board of Commissioners of the City of Oxford hereby:

1. Adopts the Tar River Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan.
2. Vests the City of Oxford's Emergency Management with the responsibility, authority, and the means to:
 - a. Inform all concerned parties of this action.
 - b. Cooperate with Federal, State, and local agencies and private firms that undertake to study, survey, map, and identify floodplain areas, and cooperate with neighboring communities with respect to management of adjoining floodplain areas in order to prevent exacerbation of existing hazard impacts.
3. Appoints City of Oxford's Emergency Management to assure that the Hazard Mitigation Plan is reviewed annually and every five years as specified in the Plan to assure that the Plan is in compliance with all State and Federal regulations and that any needed revisions or amendments to the Plan are developed and presented to the

City of Oxford Board of Commissioners for consideration.

4. Agrees to take such other official action as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the Hazard Mitigation Plan.
